## **Guide to Using MLA Style: Print Sources**

MLA (Modern Language Association) is a type of documentation style that is used for the pedagogical disciplines in the humanities.

## **Common Print Sources**

- Basic book format: Author last-name, Author first-name. Book Title. Publisher, Year of latest publication.
- No author: Title. Publisher, Year of Latest publication.
- Multiple authors: Author 1 last-name, Author 1 first-name, and Author 2 first-name last-name. Book Title. Publisher, Year of latest publication.
- Book by corporation/corporate Authors: Name of Corporation/Corporate Authors. Title. Publisher, Year of latest publication.
- Multivolume work: Author last-name, Author first-name. Title. Edited by/Translated by First-name Last-name, vol. number, Publisher, Year of latest publication.
- Book with multiple editions: Author last-name, Author first-name. Title. number ed., Publisher, Year of latest publication.
- A work prepared by an editor: Author last-name, Author first-name. Title, edited by First-name Last-name, Publisher, Year of latest publication.
- An anthology: Editor last-name, Editor first-name, editors. Title, Publisher, Year of latest publication.
- A work from an anthology: Author last-name, Author first-name. "Title of essay/ short story."
  Title of Anthology, edited by First-name Last-name, Publisher, Year of latest publication,
  page numbers of work.
- An introduction, preface, foreword, or afterword: Author last-name, Author first-name. Type of piece. *Title*, by Author of entire work's name, Publisher, Year of latest publication, pp. page number-page number.
