Subject: Nomination of Ms. Caroline Collier for the Irene Rose Community Service Award

We are writing this letter nominating **Ms. Caroline Collier** for the **Irene Rose Community Service Award**. Caroline Collier has been a lecturer in the Department of Information Systems and Computer Science since 2000. In our respective leadership roles, Dean and Associate Dean, former department chair, and in an interim-capacity managing faculty in the Department of Information Systems and Computer Science, we have experienced first-hand how the quality and impact of her service to the department, college, university, and community.

Since 2002, Caroline has served as the Director of the Center of Design and E-commerce (CODEC), formerly the Multi-Media Technology Center, where she assists small businesses with the design and maintenance of their websites. Additionally, she has agreed to serve as the co-director of the recently established Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship, alongside Dr. Nicholas Creel. CODEC will merge with our new center. In her long-serving role as CODEC director, she has created and/or maintained sites for organizations such as Lockerly Arboretum, Rock Hawk Effigy & Trails, Baldwin County Sheriff's Office, Eatonton/Putnam County Chamber of Commerce, Hancock County Government, Georgia Rural Health Association, and Historical Glen Mary Plantation. Ms. Collier goes above and beyond to make sure that she understands what each organization needs. Caroline applied for and received a USDA grant in 2016 that further enabled her to spend the next few years assisting rural communities to improve their online presence.

As part of creating and maintaining an online presence, Caroline oversees student workers. She trains students in the software used to create and maintain the websites. She oversees the students' work to be sure it is of high quality. This often takes way longer than if she had done the job herself. Caroline has provided many transformational experiences to our students as they obtained marketable experience through work with local organizations. Caroline also serves as the content manager for the College of Business & Technology web site. She works with department chairs and the dean to be sure that current content is presented.

In addition to her work through CODEC, Caroline serves as the faculty advisor for Georgia College Women in Technology (GC WIT). She helped to start the organization with her graduate assistant in 2015. As the faculty advisor, Ms. Collier assists students in fund raising to help send a student to the Grace Hopper Celebration of Women in Computing Conference as well as exposing students to information helping them to understand opportunities for women in the field, thus promoting Inclusive Excellence.

Caroline also does community-based engaged learning projects in her CBIS 3210 Business Analysis class. The students have worked with such organizations as Sodexo, Little Fishing Creek Golf Course, Books n Brew, Milly Grub, and Shima. Her students have designed systems that these organizations have gone on to implement to improve their business processes. For many students, this is their first major class, so the amount of time Ms. Collier spends working with her student teams is extraordinary.

Caroline also serves her department and college as a member of the International Education Committee (since 2012) and the International Student Sub-Committee (since 2016), a member of the Irene Rose Community Service Award Committee (since 2020), the Civitas Key Stakeholder Group (since 2021), as well as serving on various departmental search committees and College of Business & Technology ad-hoc committees through the years. She has also given presentations at Kids University about France. In service to her community, Ms. Collier is a Main Street Coach (organizes and oversees volunteers) for Northridge Christian Church (since 2016) and a member of Northridge Cares (since 2011). From 2005 until her youngest child graduated last spring, Caroline actively participated as a member of the John Milledge PTO where she was often a volunteer working in the concession stand for football and basketball games.

Caroline's portfolio demonstrates sustained service to the department, college, university, and community but most of all to our students. Caroline does all her service quietly, not for the accolades but for the intrinsic rewards service brings. We cannot think of a more deserving individual for the Irene Rose Community Service Award than Ms. Collier.

Dear Committee Members,

I am a proud Georgia College alumnus (MMIS '98) and have been teaching Management Information Systems at Georgia College for over 22 years. Therefore, despite the fact that I was born and raised in France, Georgia College and the Central Georgia area are my adopted home and my community. It has always been important for me to serve my community and give back with the skills I possess.

Besides my teaching activities, I have been leading the Center of Design and E-Commerce at Georgia College also known as CODEC (previously known as Multimedia Technology Center) since 2002. The Center is a learning resource center dedicated to providing professional learning experiences to graduate and undergraduate students in the J. Whitney Bunting College of Business and Technology. The Center provides a variety of web-based support and development services to the J. Whitney Bunting College of Business and Technology, to local businesses and government agencies, and regional organizations in the central Georgia area and beyond.

CODEC is based on two pillars.

1. **The Educational Pillar:** The Center takes learning beyond the traditional classroom. It provides the students the opportunity to apply and improve their intellectual and professional skills by serving the Center's clients. Students contributing to the projects may interact with the customers. They clearly, critically, and creatively address the challenges of meeting the customers' needs. They should also approach all tasks in a holistic manner. This includes audience and competitive research, organization of information, creation of audience-driven tasks, full content strategy and management, visual design, and publication and promotion of electronic channels. The expertise and experience they acquire while working for the Center give them some competitive advantage once they graduate and enter the professional world.
2. **The Community Service Pillar:** The Center provides services such as website development and maintenance (including E-commerce websites), development and maintenance of social media pages: Facebook Business page, Pinterest page, Instagram page, Twitter page, WordPress page, YouTube, and Tumblr page, Search Engine Optimization (SEO), Content Management, Development of e-newsletters, logo design and other graphic design, creation of eBay, Etsy, and Amazon stores, and branding. Once CODEC develops a website for an organization, I often train the employees or owners on how to make basic updates to their website. CODEC supports organizations and businesses flourish in their industry by helping them gain an online presence.

In 2016, I applied for a USDA grant and received \$63,000 to help Central Georgia communities. Georgia's rural counties, who have been hit hardest by the recession, are still struggling to regain footing after years of economic devastation. In particular, fourteen rural counties in Central Georgia (Baldwin, Burke, Emanuel, Glascock, Hancock, Jefferson, Jenkins, Johnson, Laurens, Putnam, Twiggs, Warren, Washington, and Wilkinson) are facing a multitude of challenges, including long-term poverty, long-term population decline, and economic distress due to loss of total jobs. Central Georgia's small businesses play a crucial role in contributing to

the region's economic recovery. Support from the USDA Rural Business Development Grant program enabled fourteen counties to overcome significant challenges (such as size; limited financial, technological, and human resources; and limited exposure to the global marketplace) by partnering with Georgia College's Center of Design and E-Commerce to develop e-commerce websites, effective social media pages, and enhanced search engine optimization of their websites. Moreover, I worked with CODEC volunteers to develop a series of video tutorials for businesses and organizations to teach how to make basic web updates. With a change in marketing techniques and expansion into global markets through e-commerce services made possible through CODEC and the USDA grant, I have been able to help some existing and new businesses in those Central Georgia's rural counties and contribute to make them thrive again.

Through CODEC, I brought Georgia College students and the community closer and bridged some of the gap between education and community service for the benefits of both students and community as a whole. With more than 21 years, at the head of CODEC, I have had the chance and opportunity to service many local organizations and businesses such as Georgia Rural Health Association, French Villedge, and Greene County Development Authority. Some examples of CODEC work and community member testimonies are provided in the pages following this narrative.

As a Management Information Systems Senior Lecturer at Georgia College, I have been teaching CBIS 3210 – Business Analysis for the past seven years. A large part of the class deals with students working in groups to help a local area business or organization improve its current management information systems. Under my leadership and guidance, student groups apply the concepts they learned in the classroom and work with the support of business or organization leaders and/or employees to complete the following:

- Identify the current information system issue(s) and at first a broad solution for it
- Determine a list of system requirements for an improved system
- Model the improved system using Data Flow Diagrams (for process modeling) and Entity Relationship Diagrams (for conceptual data modeling)
- Design the human interfaces of the new system as well as its supporting database.
- Recommend a plan of actions for the implementation and maintenance of the new system

Over the years, the students have helped many businesses and organizations. This semester, for example, one group works with Little Fishing Creek Golf Course in Milledgeville to transform its manual tee reservation system into an electronic reservation system while another group is developing a system to order employee uniforms at Reynolds Oconee. A sample of student/community project topics is available following this narrative.

In 2016, with the help of Heather Reynolds, my graduate assistant at that time, I founded the Georgia College Women in Technology Student Club (also known as GC WIT). GC WIT's overarching goal is to progress the role of women on the tech industry and to better technology education opportunities for women at Georgia College. Women currently hold only **26.7%** of tech-related jobs in the United States. The Club promotes diversity in the field and supports women majoring or minoring in computer science, management information systems, and data

science. In order to reach this goal, I have connected the GC WIT members with successful professional women that work in the tech industry in our community as they came as speakers and supporters of the Club. Building this network between those women and our students has been instrumental in supporting the Club and sponsoring each year a student to attend the Grace Hopper Women in Technology Celebration Conference. In addition, this year, I have been part of the organization of the first GC Women in Technology Day with the tremendous help of the GC WIT members and the exceptional support of some other faculty and staff at the College of Business and Technology. Twenty-three female students currently enrolled in five local high schools were on campus on February 24th to meet women IT professionals, to be mentored by GC female students majoring in a technology field, and to have a taste of fun technology activities from virtual reality and robotics to a competition with an enterprise resource planning simulation. The event was a success, and we are planning on making this GC WIT Day an annual event.

I would like to thank you for your consideration for the Irene Rose Community Service Award.

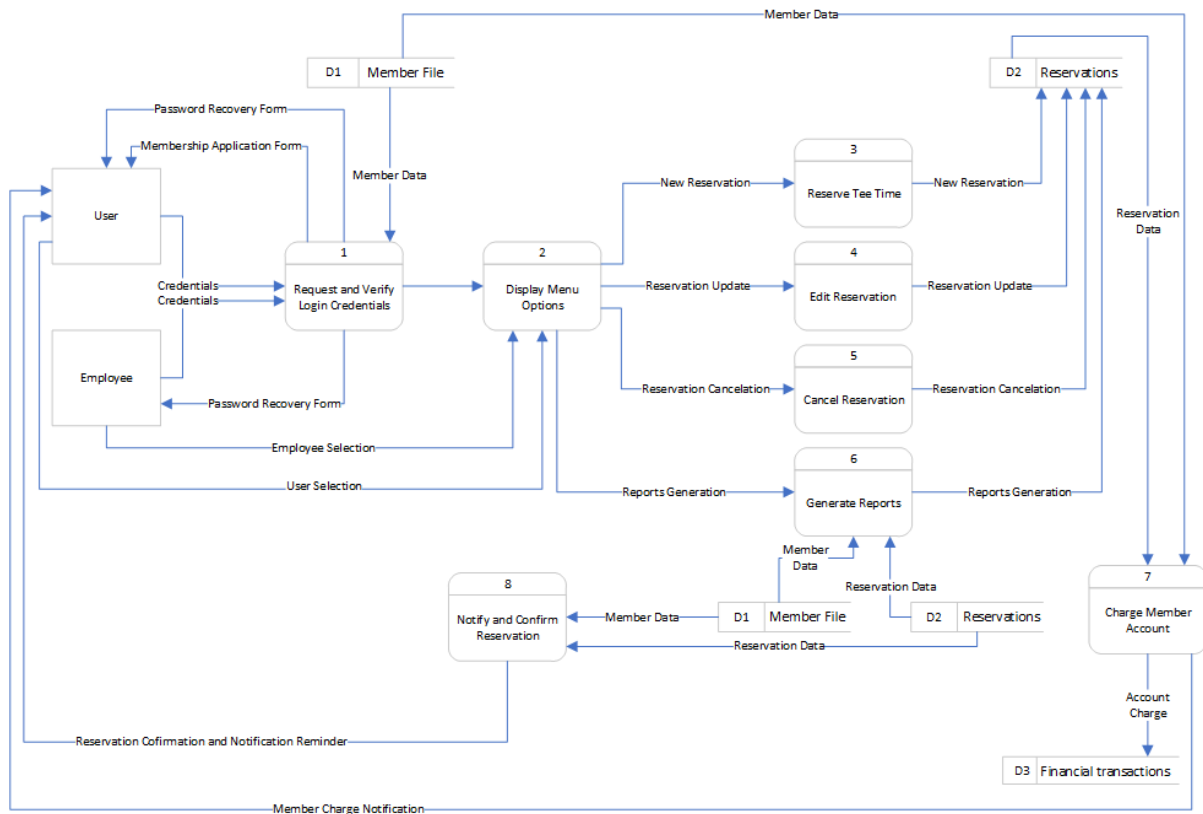

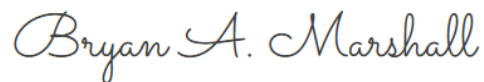
