#### SRIS Update: Spring 2017

During the Spring 2017, 17,475 instructional evaluation forms were completed by GC students. The response rates by department across colleges ranged from 24.26% to 77.67%. The following departments had the highest student response rates:

# Fall 2016 & Spring 2017 Student Travel Funds Awarded

MURACE funded 107 student researchers for a total of \$31,861.50 at an average of \$245.82 per researcher to present at conferences in the United States. To quality for funding, all students had to have presentation proposals accepted. There was an increase of 25 student researchers funded and an additional 7 faculty or staff mentors participating in the 2016/2017 (fall/spring) over 2015/2016 (fall/spring) competition. Students presented at numerous conferences including: Academy of Economics & Finance Conference, American Musicological Society Conference, Atlantic Marketing Association, Association of Third World Studies Conference, Georgia Association of Historians Annual Conference, Gulf-South Summit, NCUR Memphis, SE Chapter of American College of Sports Medicine, SE Regional American Chemical Society Conference, SE Section of Am Physics Society Conference, and Southern Political Science Association Conference among many others.
