Updated Religious Observance Policy

Georgia College values the religious diversity of our students. Major religious holidays that will be observed on class days are included on the academic calendar for each term.

Students are permitted to miss class in observance of religious holidays and other activities observed by a religious group of which the student is a member without academic penalty. Observance is limited to the date(s) of the holiday; supplemental time (e.g., travel time to go home to observe the holiday with family) is not eligible for accommodation. Exercising one's rights under this policy is subject to the GC Honor Code.

Students who will miss class in observance of a religious holiday or event are required to notify each instructor in writing within the first week of class of the semester in which the observance occurs and to make up the coursework missed as a result of the absence. The Religious Observance Faculty Notification Form may be used to facilitate this notification. The nature of the make-up assignments and the deadline for completion of such assignments are at the sole discretion of the instructor. Given the time limitations inherent in completing end-of-semester assignments and final exams, this policy does not apply during finals week. Students are expected to take final exams at the scheduled times and complete end-of-semester work by the deadlines set by each instructor.

Failure to follow the prescribed procedures voids all student rights under this policy. Students may appeal actions taken by an instructor under this policy through the GC <u>academic grievance process</u>.

Georgia College Provost's Visiting Scholars Program

The Visiting Scholar's Program is part of an intentional effort to further our interdisciplinary collaborations, to support student learning, and to engage faculty with scholars across disciplines. Congratulations to the following departments and their Visiting Scholars, who will be on campus Spring 2023!

- **Department of Teacher Education**: Dr. Juarez Harris, assistant professor, Southern Utah University. Dr. Harris is the co-author of *White Parents, Black Children*: *Understanding Adoption and Race* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2017) and will present her research on Black teacher exemplars to engage faculty and students in raising consciousness.
- Department of Communication: Dr. Jenna Hanchey, assistant professor, Arizona State University. Dr. Hanchey's
 research is fostered by her experience as a Peace Corps volunteer in Tanzania. Her scholarship examines aid,
 development, and volunteer work in Africa.
- **Department of Communication**: Dr. R. Jarrod Atchison, associate professor, Wake Forest University. Dr. Atchison is the John Kevin Medica Director of Debate of Wake Forest University's national championship-winning (CEDA 2022) debate team. Dr. Atchison will deliver a keynote address for his new, co-authored book *We Are Not One People: Secession and Separatism in American Politics Since* 1776 (Oxford University Press, 2022), facilitate a debate workshop, and judge a public debate.
- Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences: Dr. Rebecca Bixby, research assistant professor, University of New Mexico. Dr. Bixby was recently appointed Director of the University of New Mexico Water Resources Program. Her research on aquatic ecosystems focuses on the responses and adaptation of aquatic organisms to natural and anthropogenic stressors like fire, drought, and flooding.
