GC Provost Summer 2023 Research Fellows

The purpose of the *Georgia College Provost Summer Research Fellows* (GC PSRF) program is to provide additional support for faculty to disseminate their research, artistic work and/or teaching and learning scholarship in a peer-reviewed publication and/or juried context. The program allows faculty to write their scholarship or prepare a performance or exhibition. The goal is to increase the scholarly productivity of Georgia College & State University faculty by making additional resources (i.e., time) available. By increasing our dissemination of scholarship through peer-reviewed/juried outlets, we will enhance our national reputation; and the higher education learning community will have an opportunity to learn about the exceptional work that is occurring at the university. Furthermore, this work also impacts students.

This program is not for initiating research. GC has internal grants to assist faculty research. The program is designed to provide uninterrupted time to complete a project that has been on the back burner for some time. The expected outcome is a submission of finished work for peer-reviewed publication or juried artistic work. The recipients present their work to the university community.

With the start of the Spring 2023 semester, the first floor and atrium-area of the University Library opened to students for 24-hour access, Sunday through Thursday.

With the exception of the day before a holiday, the library will open at 12:00pm on Sunday. At 10:00pm., access to the library building will be available by card-swipe only. At 1:00am., the second and third floors of the library will close.

The first floor, including the atrium area, will remain open via card swipe access through 7:30am. At 7:30am., visitors will be able to access the library without swiping their card. The second and third floors will open at 8:00am. All floors of the library close at 6:00 pm. on Friday. On Saturday, all floors of the library open at 10:00am. and close at 6:00 pm.
