QUICK FACTS

Veterinarians are required to complete years of study and hands-on clinical experience and earn a **Doctor of Veterinary Medicine** (**DVM**) degree before they are fully prepared to enter into professional practice. Currently, the **University of Georgia** (**vet.uga.edu**) has the only veterinary program in **Georgia**. As such, these programs can be highly competitive.

Here are things to keep in mind as you begin navigating the process:

- Applications usually require some combination of these materials: minimum GPA, the Veterinary Medical College Application
 Service (VMCAS) essay, veterinary experience hours, letters of recommendation, standardized test scores, and an
 interview. Thoroughly read through the requirements for admission for each school/program.
 - You can find a list of schools and their admission requirements here: <u>applytovetschool.org/</u>. Please note that the list may not always be comprehensive or fully up to date.
- It's important you apply as early as possible since completing your application can be a lengthy process, and application processing times vary.
 - <u>VMCAS Quick Start Guide</u> provides a suggested timeline that includes key actions to keep the application process on track. This timeline may need to be adjusted based on individual program deadlines and requirements.

 While many veterinary programs no longer require the GPE, you should check with each program to confirm their admission.
- While many veterinary programs no longer require the GRE, you should check with each program to confirm their admission requirements.
- Most schools require animal or veterinary experience, but the hours needed vary between programs.
 - Animal experience and veterinary experience are both valuable on your application, but schools tend to request veterinary experience because it is under the supervision of a practicing veterinarian.
 - These hours must be completed by the time the VMCAS application is submitted.

COMMON APPLICATION SERVICES (VMCAS)

American Association of Veterinary Medical Colleges' (AAVMC - www.aavmc.org)

- In order to apply, you will use the American Association of Veterinary Medical Colleges' (<u>AAVMC</u>) application system: Veterinary Medical College Application Service (<u>VMCAS</u>).
- Some schools may have secondary application requirements outside of the VMCAS, so it's important to thoroughly read the
 application requirements.
- The deadline for submitting your application through VMCAS usually falls annually in the middle of September.
 - Visit <u>vmcas.liaisoncas.com/</u> to create your VMCAS account.

APPLICATION ESSAY PREPARATION

As part of your application through VMCAS, you will be required to write a <u>statement of purpose</u>. It is a one-page essay of no more than **3,000 characters** that gives admissions committees at veterinary programs a clear picture of who you are. This essay needs to answer the following question: **Why do you want to pursue a career in veterinary medicine?**

Here are some things to keep in mind as you answer the question:

- Because this essay will be sent to all of the programs you apply to, **keep your topic general.** Once your essay is submitted, it cannot be edited.
- Your essay will be typed in VMCAS, and the system will automatically track your character limit. If your essay exceeds the character limit, you cannot save what was written.
 - Formatting such as tabs, italics, multiple spaces, etc. are not saved by the system. To mark a new paragraph, hit enter twice.
 - This essay is about showcasing your medium and long-term academic and career goals. Be yourself, avoid using clichés, and focus on only relevant information.

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*Check with each individual school for their GPA and score requirements. **Keep in mind that quality outweighs quantity when obtaining hours.

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INTERVIEW PREPARATION

Many programs require an admission interview as part of the application process.

When preparing for professional school interviews, it is important that you practice ahead of time.

- Several pre-vet schools hold interviews as part of the admissions process.
- Utilize resources in Handshake and book an appointment with a Career Advisor to further assist you.
- "Why do you want to pursue a career in veterinary medicine?" or "Why our program?" are common types of questions that you want to prepare for.
- Develop **in-depth responses** to interview questions that are specific to you and how you fit into the program you're applying for.
- There are different types of interviews for veterinary school such as **traditional interviews**, **group interviews**, **mixed multiple interviews** (MMI); with MMI's becoming more popular.
