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## QUICK FACTS

**Occupational therapy** is a healthcare profession focused on helping individuals of all ages achieve independence and improve their quality of life through meaningful activities. It addresses physical, cognitive, emotional, and social challenges, enabling people to perform daily tasks, work, and leisure activities effectively.

While programs vary, in order to enter practice it is required to successfully complete a **Master of Science (MS) in Occupational Therapy** or an **Occupational Therapy Doctorate**.

Here are some general aspects to consider when looking into specific programs:

- View a list of accredited programs via the **American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA)** website ([www.aota.org](http://www.aota.org)).
- Applications usually require some combination of these materials: **minimum GPA, Graduate Record Examinations (GRE) scores, observation hours, letters of recommendation, a personal statement, a cover letter, and an interview**. Thoroughly read through the requirements each school/program has for admission.
- **Common Application:** Many schools require your application to be submitted through the **Occupational Therapy Common Application System (OTCAS - [otcas.liasoncas.com](http://otcas.liasoncas.com))**.
- **Shadowing Hours:** The amount of required hours varies by program. Check the program's admission requirements when obtaining hours.

  - Some programs require hours to be verified by the OT you shadowed. Be sure to verify each program's requirements.
- **Interview Preparation:** When preparing for professional school interviews, it is important that you practice ahead of time.
  - **Be prepared to answer common questions: "Why do you want to be an occupational therapist?" or "Why our program?"**
  - Utilize resources in Handshake and book an appointment with a pre-professional advisor to further assist you. Keep in mind that not all programs require interviews and the process varies from school to school.
- **Letters of Recommendation**
  - When requesting letters of recommendation, OTCAS requires students to submit at least 3 references and no more than 5.
  - You should also seek occupational therapists and other industry professionals you've worked with.
  - Certain schools may have specifications on letter amounts/writers—check the website of each program you're applying to.

## GRADUATE RECORD EXAM (GRE)

### Graduate Record Examination (GRE)

- Applicants are required to take the GRE only by some programs, but **required minimum scores vary**.
- You can register for the GRE through the Educational Testing Service (ETS - [www.ets.org](http://www.ets.org)).
- The exam is made up of 3 sections including: **Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning, and Analytical Writing**.
- Be sure to take the test in enough time to make the application deadlines.

### Prepare in advance!

- Spend time prior to your test date familiarizing yourself with the types of questions in each section.
- You can study through taking a course with a company like Kaplan or Princeton Review, or you can purchase study books online that contain practice tests and examples.

## KEY NUMBERS

- Minimum GPA Range: **2.75-3.25**
- 2024-25 Average GRE Score: verbal **151.3**; quantitative **156.9**; written **3.5**
- Minimum Observation Hours Range: **25-70**

**\*Check with each individual school for their GPA and score requirements.**  
**\*\*Keep in mind that quality outweighs quantity when obtaining hours.**

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## COMMON APPLICATION SERVICES (OTCAS)

### Occupational Therapy Common Application System (OTCAS)

- Many schools require your application to be submitted through this system.
- An account has to be made to utilize this application service. You can create your account here: <https://otcas.cas.myliaison.com/>
- **Familiarize yourself with the site, the applications themselves, and what materials are necessary for each application.**
- **Keep in mind that not all schools use OTCAS/OTACAS!** Thoroughly read through each program's admission procedures.

## APPLICATION ESSAY PREPARATION

Personal statements used to apply to schools through **OTCAS** should be general and not program specific.

- Pay attention to the character count (including spaces) allotted for the essay.
- OTCAS asks that you **"Explain why you selected occupational therapy as a career and how this degree relates to your immediate and long-term professional goals. We invite you to share how your lived experiences (e.g., personal, professional, cultural, etc.) have influenced your interest in pursuing OT."**
- You should start writing your personal statement early and follow the instructions listed carefully to ensure you follow all the parameters set.
- **Some programs will require an additional essay** that will pertain to their program after receiving your OTCAS application.

## PRE-OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY AT GCSU

Georgia College offers a **B.S. in Exercise Science with a Pre-Professional concentration** designed for students who plan to pursue further education in professional programs such as occupational therapy, physical therapy, physician assistant studies, and more. This concentration equips students with a strong background in health and human sciences while ensuring they complete the necessary prerequisites for graduate study.
