OUICK FACTS

Physical therapy is a healthcare field dedicated to improving movement, relieving pain, and restoring physical function for individuals of all ages. To become a physical therapist (<u>PT</u>), you must pursue a **Doctor of Physical Therapy or Doctor of Physiotherapy (DPT)**. You must thoroughly read the requirements that each school has for admission.

Here are some things for physical therapy applicants to consider:

- The **American Physical Therapy Association** (**APTA**: <u>www.apta.org/</u>), covers the general admission process for physical therapy programs, <u>www.apta.org/your-career/careers-in-physical-therapy/pt-admissions-process</u>.
- You can review programs through the APTA website: ptcasdirectory.apta.org/.
- Applications usually require some combination of these materials:
 - Minimum GPA, GRE scores, letters of recommendation, a personal statement, a cover letter, observation hours, and an interview.
 - Some, but not all, programs require interviews, and the process varies from school to school.
 - Thoroughly read through the requirements each school/program has for admission.
- The number of **physical therapy shadowing hours** required varies from school to school, but most programs want experience from at least **2 physical therapy settings (inpatient and outpatient)**, **often supervised by a licensed practitioner.**
- <u>Personal Statements</u> used to apply to physical therapy programs being submitted through PTCAS should be a general overview
 as to why you chose this profession and answer the prompt: "What unique traits will you bring to the physical therapy
 profession that will help you to be successful?"
- When requesting letters of recommendation, most programs are seeking 1-4 letters from licensed physical therapists, science
 faculty, advisors, or other professionals that can adequately speak on your behalf.
 - However, certain schools may only accept a certain number or have specifications on letter writers, so it is vital to check the website of each program you are applying to.

COMMON APPLICATION SERVICES (PTCAS)

- Most schools require applications to be submitted through the **Physical Therapist Centralized Application Service** (<u>PTCAS</u>: <u>ptcas.liaisoncas.com/</u>
 - However, **not all programs use PTCAS**. Check the admission procedures for each school to ensure you apply in the correct location.
 - APTA offers information to help prepare you for applying through PTCAS (www.apta.org/cas/ptcas/application-prep).

GRADUATE RECORD EXAM (GRE)

Graduate Record Examination (GRE)

- Applicants are required to take the GRE only by some programs, but required minimum scores vary.
- You can register for the GRE through the Educational Testing Service (ETS: www.ets.org/gre.html).
- The exam is made up of 3 sections including: Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning, and Analytical Writing.
- Be sure to take the test in enough time to make the application deadline.

Prepare in advance!

- Spend time prior to your test date familiarizing yourself with the types of questions in each section.
- You can study through taking a course with a company like Kaplan or Princeton Review, or you can purchase study books online that contain practice tests and examples.

*Check with each individual school for their GPA and score requirements.

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INTERVIEW PREPARATION

Physical Therapy programs may require competitive applicants to visit the campus for an interview or conduct a virtual interview.

- Interview format varies by institution and may require applicants to speak with a single faculty member, a student, a physical therapist, or a panel of interviewers, or participate in an orientation program.
- Applicants should be prepared to discuss why they have chosen to pursue a career in physical therapy and how they perceive the role of physical therapists in health care.
- The applicants' written communication skills may also be measured with an on-site essay.

When preparing for professional school interviews, a lot of the same rules apply as with most job interviews.

- Visit **Handshake** to view the Career Center's interview resources and handouts.
- Practice to answer common questions: "Why physical therapy?" or "Why our program?"
- Ensure you have **in-depth responses** to interview questions that are specific to you and how you fit into the program you're applying for.
- Not all programs require interviews, and the process varies from school to school, so read the program's webpage thoroughly.

PRE-PHYSICAL THERAPY AT GCSU
