Who can I speak to confidentially on campus?

The Women's Center
Provides:
- Support for victim-survivors of PBIV
- Advocacy throughout Administrative and Criminal processes

Counseling Services
Provides:
- Individual and group counseling
- Referrals

If you have been sexually assaulted or experienced dating/domestic violence, consider seeking medical attention for the following:

- General check for injuries and aftercare information
- Access to emergency contraception
- Testing and prescriptions for medications in case of exposure to sexually transmitted infections
- Pregnancy testing
- Medical forensic exam (rape kit)

If you or someone you know has experienced **sexual assault, dating/domestic violence and/or stalking**, there are two main reporting options to consider:

Administrative (Title IX Process)		Criminal
Reports are made to certain campus officials.	Who do I report to?	Reports are made to the police.
Title IX coordinator or their designee	Who investigates?	Police
After investigation, the case would move to either the University Judicial Process (when the accused is a student) or the Progressive Discipline Process (when the accused is an employee).	How is the case decided?	After the investigation is complete, it will move to the District Attorney's office, who decides to file charges. After that it could go to trial.
Administrative cases are typically completed in sixty days.	How long does the process take?	The criminal process can take up to two years.
University System of Georgia policies	What laws/policies are the basis for the investigation?	State of Georgia laws
Preponderance of the evidence (more likely than not)	What is the standard of proof?	Beyond a reasonable doubt

Defining Power-Based Interpersonal Violence

Project BRAVE defines power-based interpersonal violence (PBIV) as violence that is based on one person acting against another person to gain or maintain power and control over that person. It includes acts of violence such as: rape, sexual assault, dating/domestic violence, stalking, and other forms of sexual misconduct (sexual harassment, street harassment, sexual exploitation, etc).

PBIV can impact anyone regardless of sex, gender expression or identity, sexual orientation, race, socioeconomic status, etc.
