## Disability Services and Academic Accommodations

Academic accommodation as required by law is not meant to compromise academic standards. It is intended to create an opportunity for students with disabilities to learn and for professors to evaluate fairly. Students with disabilities expect access and opportunities, not alterations in academic expectations. Academic requirements and course objectives should remain unchanged. Modifications may need to be made in the way a student receives information or demonstrates knowledge but not in the academic proficiency standards.

In accordance with the USG Board of Regents' policies and procedures, the University's non-discrimination policy, the Georgia Equal Employment for People with Disabilities Code, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990 as amended, and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, Georgia College prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability and provides reasonable accommodations to eligible staff, faculty, and students unless doing so will impose an undue hardship on the University.

There is no one list of reasonable academic accommodations that will serve the needs of all students with disabilities. The following are some basic examples:

- Extended time on examinations (This does not mean extended preparation time, except in rare instances)
- Provide exams in alternate format (If appropriate to subject matter)
- Assist students in locating a note taker in class
- Allow students to take exams in a distraction-reduced setting

The Board of Regents has established definitions and criteria for documentation of disorders which affect learning. Georgia College will adhere to these definitions as delineated in Section 2.22 of the Academic Affairs Handbook.

### GC Graduate Faculty Status

The 2018-2019 Graduate Council approved the following procedures for Submitting Nominations to or Deletions from the Graduate Faculty:

- The chairperson initiates a faculty member's nomination for Regular or Associate Graduate Faculty status by signing and dating a cover sheet entitled "Nomination to Membership In the Graduate Faculty [of] Georgia College & State University" found [here](#).
- The chairperson submits the application by attaching the cover sheet and a current copy of the nominee's vita to the appropriate college committee (i.e., Graduate Committee) for review.
- The College Graduate Committee recommends to the College Dean that the nominee be awarded or denied Graduate Faculty status.
- The college dean, or designee, forwards all information using *DocuSign* on or before August 1 to the Office of the Provost.
- The Director of The Graduate School reviews, signs, and dates the cover sheet.
- The nominee is notified, in writing, by the Provost, or designee, of the final decision regarding appointment or denial to the Graduate Faculty status.
- The chairperson or dean may recommend that a faculty member's Regular or Associate status on the Graduate Faculty be terminated by following the same process noted above.
